**13:30-15:30 Effectiveness and Efficiency as Elements of “Convenience”:
Complementarity with Privacy?**

From a law enforcement point of view, the use of new technologies should not merely be considered for its “convenience”. The implementation of modern innovation into law enforcement practices should in fact be assessed on its effectiveness (doing the right thing), efficiency (doing things right) and added value to law enforcement operations. Increased efficiency, nevertheless, also entails large scale data processing and thus, greater potential for negatively impacting fundamental rights. However, if implemented with appropriate safeguards as well as oversight mechanisms, these technologies could actually enhance the protection of our fundamental rights. The aim would, thus, be to avoid a trade-off and to ensure complementarity between convenience and privacy.
